- This will be challenging for working parents who have no support available especially as the wrap around provisions are no longer available. As shared numerous times in the newsletter the parking of some people around the school is inconsiderate and dangerous and if collection isn't staggered or continues to be limited to one entrance this is difficult for people who cannot walk and ensure they park safely. I appreciate the extra clubs offered to children, especially physical exercise. It was a shame the most recent morning offers had to be cancelled due to poor uptake. Y4
- I agree with the shorter lunch time but Moving to a later start time will clash with parents who need to drop off and start work at certain times. Y1

Responses from parents who answered No

- With no wraparound provision this would make school day shorter and thus be harder for parents. I'm not happy with idea of shorter day. could they have afternoon break instead of shorter day? Y2
- If the only option is to reduce playtime during lunch then, rather than reducing the school day, an extra 15minute play should be added elsewhere in the day. Y5
- With the lack of wraparound care in this area. I don't think it is a good idea to shorten the school day. this would affect working parents that have just enough time to drop off and collect the children as it. to do this I believe a wraparound childcare service would be needed. Y5
- I have really struggled with the later drop off that began with covid due to not having time to get to work on time. When this is coupled with the cancellation of breakfast club it has made things very difficult. A 5-minute earlier finish wouldn't impact me that much; however it can make a huge difference if travelling from work to school or vice versa. Y3
- It makes a difficult juggling act even more difficult for working parents, especially when coupled with the closure of breakfast and after school clubs and only 2 childminders that serve the school. Y5
- Children have already dealt with so much change and need time in school to catch up after covid disruptions. Although we realise this change wouldn't increase classroom learning time, it would offer more opportunities for all the benefits that outdoor exercise brings, meaning classroom learning is improved. Also, with the before and after school provision being removed it makes it more difficult and incurs extra costs for working parents.
- I'm not sure how long their lunch is in the first place. if you are reducing down to 45 minutes I have no issue for this but reducing down to 30 minutes seems like not enough time to eat and have some down time. I especially like this idea if the time saved is used for additional learning. Y2
- Starting at 8:50 would not leave enough time to get to work for 9am and now there is no breakfast club this would be an issue for us. No issue with the 3:10 finish time. Y1
- Working commitments would mean I would not make the start of my working day if drop off was at 8:50. currently the teacher often does not come out until 8:45 and this has an impact as it is. Y1
- I do not support this move especially for full time working parents with no longer having access to a breakfast club facility. this would affect both myself & my husband from being able to get to work on time. Y1

- This would impact my job seriously as I will never make it to work on time and raise the costs of childcare because I would have to pay childcare in the morning as well as the afternoon. F2
- if lunchtime is shortened then teaching time should be longer clearly especially now with all the lost time of education in a last year. F2
- a 10 minutes change is unfavourable for parents who have already scheduled their working time around the school hours. it's already a struggle to come in terms with an employer about one's family life. F1
